ADDITIONAL NOTES

- \$100 Booking Fee required to hold a booking reservation. Cancellations permitted with no penalty up to 30 days prior to the event. Booking Fee will be forfeited if cancellation received less than 30 days prior to the event and a new renter cannot be found.
- Rent and damage deposit required 14 days in advance of the event.

DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

RKHCA Appeal of 5-Storey ML33 Condo Project to be Heard on November 15

In last month's edition of The Review we provided an update regarding the ML33 condo project, a proposed 5-storey, 135-unit development to be constructed on the north side of 33 Avenue SW in the first block east of Crowchild Trail, which has now received both rezoning and development permit approval from the City. That update also outlined several of the RKHCA Development Committee's concerns regarding the project, which concerns led to an appeal being filed to the Subdivision and Development Appeal Board (SDAB). That appeal has been assigned appeal number SDAB2016-0079 and will be heard by the SDAB on Tuesday, November 15 at 9am.

We encourage all residents of Richmond/Knob Hill and Marda Loop, particularly those who live close to the site of the proposed ML33 development, as well as those who operate businesses in the Marda Loop business district, to:

- learn more about the RKHCA's appeal of the proposed ML33 development by reading the preliminary appeal report, a PDF copy of which can be found on the News/Events page of the RKHCA website (www. richmondknobhill.ca); and
- 2) make a submission to the SDAB, whether in support of the appeal or in opposition to the appeal, which can be done either in writing in advance of the hearing or in person at the hearing.

To be included in the final appeal report written submissions should be received by the SDAB by noon on Monday, November 7 (8 days prior to the hearing of the appeal).

If you would like to make a verbal presentation to the SDAB at the hearing of the appeal, you should contact the SDAB as soon as possible to let them know.

This is a very important redevelopment project for our community, as it is the first major redevelopment project on the north side of 33 Avenue SW under the recently approved ARP (the development permit application for the 4-storey Odeon building currently under construction on the NE corner of 33 Avenue SW and 20 Street SW was approved shortly before the ARP came into effect, and therefore was not subject to its provisions), and will set a significant precedent for future redevelopment projects. Let your voice be heard!

Proposed Changes to Crowchild Trail

The City held open houses in early October to obtain feedback on the latest version of their planned changes to the portion of Crowchild Trail that runs from 17th Avenue SW to 24th Avenue NW. Proposed changes include road widening to add a 3rd NB lane to the Bow River bridge and a 2nd NB lane exiting to Bow Trail EB, relocating the NB and SB Crowchild bus stops at 17th Avenue SW approximately 1 block further north, improving the pedestrian infrastructure on the 17th Avenue SW overpass, installing a new pedestrian bridge across Crowchild Trail from the south end of the Tecumseh navel base to the 22 Street SW off-leash park, installing another pedestrian bridge across Crowchild Trail just north of the 17th Avenue overpass. Proposed Changes to 17th Avenue SW and 37 Street SW

The City also held "Main Street" open houses in early October to obtain feedback on contemplated changes to the areas bordering the portion of 17th Avenue SW that runs from Crowchild Trail to 37 Street SW, and to the areas bordering the portion of 37 Street SW that runs from Bow Trail to 30 Avenue SW. These 2 corridors have been identified as "Main Streets" with potential for higher density residential and mixed-use development, as well as public realm improvements to turn them into "complete streets" that work well for pedestrians, cyclists, transit and vehicles. 

With uncertainty on whether the exchange rate will improve any time soon, you may be inclined to forego your southern sojourn next winter – but you have other options.

- Explore the exchange rates offered by boutique currency exchange companies. The Canadian Snowbirds Association provides a currency exchange program that offers very competitive rates.
- Buy U.S. dollars over the year whenever the loonie goes
- Open a U.S. dollar account at a bank that offers no-cost transfers from a Canadian U.S. dollar account to a U.S. dollar account in the United States.
- If you're flying, consider doing so from a U.S. border airport where airfares may be cheaper.
- Check out more affordable destinations away from the usual southern hotspots; the exchange rate and cost of living may be more favourable in Mexico, Costa Rica, Panama and other non-traditional southern locations.

Mobility Update

Fall is back, school is underway and the leaves are changing and along with this some changes to how we move around the neighbourhood, whether by foot, bike or car. As you may have noticed, the 20th Street Bikeway is almost complete with a few more changes to come once the Odeon construction finishes. Double-check for bikes particularly when turning right or parking as the bike may have the right of way and can appear quickly. Parking in the bike lane itself is prohibited and is being enforced (Calgary Parking Authority). The RKHCA also plans to improve bike parking in the community.

Speeding and/or perceived speeding on residential streets and in playground/school zones continues to be a problem. Residents feel that people drive too fast on local streets for their children, pets and even themselves to feel safe and enjoy the neighbourhood. The City is considering lowering speed limits on residential streets within Calgary and it is proven that stopping distance and reaction time greatly diminish with higher speeds. Life is not predictable but science is.

Please remember these streets bring each of us to and from home and everyone wants to arrive safely whatever their mode of transportation. IN & AROUND CALGARY

EMS: Yielding to Emergency Vehicles

Time is the enemy in any emergency. For everyone's safety it is important for motorists to understand how to correctly yield right of way to emergency vehicles with lights and siren activated. You can help EMS, police, and fire get to the scene quickly and safely by following these rules of the road.

When an emergency vehicle approaches with lights and siren activated:

- If you're in the middle of an intersection when an emergency vehicle approaches with lights and siren activated, safely clear the intersection.
- On a one or two lane road, motorists should move to the right side of the road, slow down, and then stop. Remember to signal.
- On a road with three or more lanes, motorists should move to the nearest side of the road and stop. If driving in the centre lane, move to the right side of the road and stop. Remember to signal.
- Come to a complete stop and wait for the emergency vehicle to pass. Shoulder check for more emergency vehicles (there is often more than one!) before re-entering traffic flow. Remember to signal.
- Emergency vehicles might use any available road space to maneuver. This could include the shoulders or left hand turning lanes in order to pass other traffic.

When operating a vehicle:

- Drive attentively and defensively at all times. Be cognizant to sirens and be prepared to yield the right of way.
- It is Alberta law for motorists to slow down to at least 60 km/hour (unless a lower speed is posted) when driving past a stopped emergency vehicle. This includes EMS, police, fire, and tow trucks with their lights activated.
- Do not break the rules of the road in order to give right of way to an emergency vehicle. This could include proceeding through a red light or making an illegal turn. Actions such as these jeopardize all motorists in the area.
- Drivers must place their full attention on the roadway and toward the safe operation of their vehicle at all times. The fine for distracted driving in Alberta is \$287.00.
- Always leave plenty of space between your vehicle and an emergency vehicle should it be required to stop suddenly.

We Remember

As November 11th approaches, I hope you once again take time to remember those that have sacrificed, those that continue to take on the perilous work of safeguarding Canadian freedoms, and the soldiers who are now representing us abroad as peacekeepers.

It is my honour and pleasure to serve as our nation's Minister of Veterans Affairs. In this role I am entrusted with the mandate to support our veterans – young and old – and in the commemoration of all of Canada's past conflicts.

Just one of the memories that I will be reflecting on this month is the impact of the First World War on Western Canada High School where some 170 Old Boys and 6 Masters had enlisted by 1916. The Calgary Herald estimated some 40% of all the boys who ever attended the college had enlisted and went off to war: and you can see this sacrifice memorialized at the cenotaph today just behind the school. Young men, with their entire futures in front of them, were brought into one of the world's most brutal conflicts and sacrificed themselves our freedoms. It is a story I think of often when I attend ceremonies across this country and serve as Minister of Veterans Affairs.

I invite you to look online on my ministry's website at http://www.veterans.gc.ca/eng/events to see what events are in our community.

Now, it has been nearly a year since I was appointed by Prime Minister Justin Trudeau as a member of his cabinet. In last year's election campaign we promised Canadians a government that would uphold our sacred obligation to veterans.

In Budget 2016 the Government of Canada put \$5.6 bil**lion** additional dollars into Veterans Affairs, showcasing a clear commitment to bettering the lives of our nation's

This year we have announced the re-openings of the nine Veterans Affairs offices closed by the previous gov-

ernment. In addition to reopening these much needed offices - which support veterans across this country - we are also opening an extra office in Surrey, BC, to support the thousands of veterans who live in that city. Above and beyond this we have increased benefits to veterans by increasing the Earning Loss Benefit to 90% from 75%, increased the Disability Award and are on track to hire up to 400 more frontline staff. With increasing benefits and frontline staff we can better support veterans and make sure they transition smoother into civilian life.

It is in this sacred trust I continue to work to better the lives of veterans and keep the promises we made in the 2015 election.

Snow and Ice Control

We know how to do winter in Calgary, and when it comes to clearing the snow and ice from our roads and pathways, we're getting better all the time. Throughout the winter months and especially after a big dump of snow, Calgary Roads has crews available around the clock to sand, salt and plow. Here's how it works:

Before the Snow Falls

Even before it snows, City crews are busy anti-icing road-ways to reduce the accumulation of ice and snow on the roads. A Road Salt Management Plan is followed to improve environmental protection without compromising road safety. The City also uses snow fences as part of the annual winter road maintenance program. Over 140 strategically placed snow fences reduce the build-up of drifting snow and ice on roads, and help to keep winter roads safe by improving visibility for motorists.

During and After the Snow Falls

The City sands, salts, and plows roads and select sidewalks based on a priority system, and all work is to be completed within seven days from the point a snowfall ends. Within 24 hours of the end of a snowfall, major roadways (Priority 1) with traffic volumes over 20,000 vehicles per day are completely plowed, sanded and salted. A Snow Route Parking Ban may also be declared during this time – visit www.calgary.ca to find out. Within 48 hours, all Priority 2 roadways are completed; this includes bus routes, problem areas and roads that carry over 5,000 vehicles per day. Work then continues on Priority 3 and 4 roadways, focusing on designated hills and slower speed zones, and eventually moving on to sidewalks and pathways.

What You Can Do

The City of Calgary has a very sophisticated Snow and Ice Control program, and it does great work every year, but residents need to pitch in as well.

- When you drive in the winter, don't fool around: get winter tires.
- When you cycle in the winter, perform regular maintenance on your bike.
- When you walk in the winter, wear shoes with good grip.

How To Get Mom To Agree To A Pet Lizard!

I always wanted a pet reptile as a child, but like the myriad of other exotic pets I campaigned for, I was never successful in acquiring a snake or lizard. Now as a veterinarian and Mom of two boys I get to vicariously have all kinds of wonderful pets. "The boys wanted it"; this is the story my husband gets and I'm sticking to it. Fortunately with a little research and the help of a fellow lizard lover we became the proud owners of a Leopard Gecko called "Gecky".

Gecky, the Leopard Gecko, is a perfect pet in my eyes. He eats mealworms and crickets that are dipped in a calcium powder. He has a little container of a vitaminmineral mixture he snacks on and a small water bowl. Room light is sufficient with a small heated pad stuck to the tank bottom providing additional heat he can move away or towards as he needs. Leopard Geckos can't even get out of the tank if the lid is left off by small children. Gecky did have a heat lamp (unnecessary) but that was eliminated when my six-year old tried to burn the house down. This sweet little creature will happily sit on your shirt through an evening of television. A dampened tissue is placed in the corner of the tank Gecky chose to use as his bathroom so cage cleaning is a breeze. This is a fabulous low-maintenance pet for young children with minimal supervision during handling periods. It is really gross when the tail falls off and twitches around for a while but they grow back.

Why did I say fortunately we picked a Gecko earlier? A neighbor asked us to babysit their Bearded Dragon, Steve. I have treated these wonderful attractive lizards but never kept one. Theory is easier than practice!

Steve arrived in his massive aquarium equipped with under tank heater, heat lamp, and two lights on a twelve hour cycle providing full spectrum lighting. There are multiple electronic thermometers to ensure the proper temperature gradients between 85 to 100 degrees F. Not the most attractive setup. Bearded Dragons are omnivores. So in the morning I cut Steve's veggies and fruit into pieces "smaller than the distance between his eyes". Then there was his daily quota of mealworms and crickets. Did I mention the cricket tank with over a hundred large live SINGING crickets?

Steve poops. He poops once a day and it needs to be removed immediately. I have treated thousands of animals of many, many species and I have worked in a pathology laboratory with animals in various stages of decomposition. I have to say the stench of Bearded Dragon poops elevate their owners to martyrs. Even after disposal it lingers in your nostrils and sinuses for hours. So Steve, I did like you, especially when you charged around your cage with your tail arched over your back gobbling up crickets. I liked to cuddle you Steve, but I was glad to see you go home.

If you are considering getting an exotic pet don't limit your research to learning about the care and needs of these creatures from books. Talk to people who actually own the exotic pet you're considering. Try to get a look at the set-up and even babysit as we did. Join TARAS, the Alberta Reptile and Amphibian Society. We won't be getting a Bearded Dragon but I hope the boys consider a cockatiel one day, I have always wanted one...


