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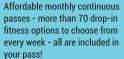

# loliday Pet Safety

The holiday season is a joyful time for many who want to include their pets in the festivities by sharing treats from the dinner table and having them be a part of the celebrations. Here are some tips and considerations to keep your pet safe:

#### Food:

• Leftover food that is rich, spicy, or fatty can be hard for pets to digest.

• Many foods are toxic or harmful for pets, including: turkey bones, artificial sweeteners and other baking ingredients, chocolate, and alcohol.

• Secure the lid on your garbage can or put your garbage outside right after the meal.

#### Décor:

• Poinsettias, Christmas cactus, and holly are toxic to cats and dogs.

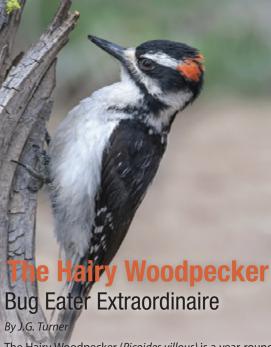
• Secure your Christmas tree if you have pets that like to climb.

- Hang breakable ornaments higher on your tree.
- With natural trees, make sure pets don't drink the water.
- Shiny tinsel and ribbons are appealing for cats, but if swallowed can cause serious injury or lead to surgery.
- Unplug holiday lights and extension cords prior to leaving your home.
- Don't put candy or chocolates under the tree.

#### Socializing:

- While hosting parties, give your pet a safe and quiet place to retreat.
- Be mindful as guests come and go as it's easy for pets to slip out unnoticed.

It is important to call your veterinarian if you suspect your pet has eaten any toxic foods or substances. For additional pet safety tips, visit calgary.ca/animalservices.



The Hairy Woodpecker (*Picoides villous*) is a year-round resident in Calgary. It is a medium sized woodpecker, with a very straight-backed posture suitable for clinging to tree trunks. The Hairy Woodpecker has a striped head, long straight bill for excavating holes in trees, and stiff long tail feathers for leaning against tree trunks. The Hairy Woodpecker is black and white: locally its wings are black checkered with white, it has a large white patch down the centre of it's black back and two white stripes on its head (with the male having a red patch at the back of its head). These birds can be found in mature forests, treed suburban areas and parks, orchards, both coniferous and deciduous forests, and small woodlots all over Canada and the United States.

#### CALGARY WILDLIFE

#### Fun Facts:

- The Hairy Woodpecker can be found from sea-level to high mountainous zones, but have somewhat different looks in different regions.
- They are frequently found alongside the smaller Downy Woodpecker.
- They will follow behind the Pileated Woodpecker, cleaning out their holes of any food left behind by the larger bird.
- They sometimes drink the sap leaking from holes made by Sapsuckers (locally the Yellow-Bellied Sapsucker).
  Hairy Woodpeckers peck out a cavity nest hole in the dead stub of a living tree (especially if it has "heartrot") or in dead trees.
- They are great helpers in the battle against bugs that harm trees, as more than 75% of their diet is made up of insects, especially wood-boring beetles, bark beetles, ants and moth pupae in their cocoons. Bark beetles are especially destructive to large stands of trees as extensive infestations can number in the billions and destroy the trees. In orchards, Hairy Woodpeckers help control outbreaks of moths. In burned out trees, wood-boring beetles often are found in large numbers, making for great feeding and nesting space for Hairy Woodpeckers.
  Hairy Woodpeckers are common visitors at backyard feeders, eating suet and sunflower seeds.
- Although they are still very widespread, they have declined in numbers in many areas. Loss of nesting sites is one problem.

# **The Decibel Dilemma – Protecting Playtime**

Children experience sound in their environment every day. Normally, these sounds are at safe levels and won't damage their hearing. However, it's not unusual for toys to be noisy enough to risk your child's hearing health. One of the most common causes of noise-induced hearing loss is repeated and extended exposure to loud noises. Safe and harmful sound levels are highly dependent on *how long* and *how often* your child is exposed to noises.

In general, sounds 85 dB and below are in the safe zone while sounds above 85 dB can start to cause damage inside the ear. Eighty-five decibels is like loud traffic. Eighty decibels is like an alarm clock or garbage disposal. Remember, the decibel scale is logarithmic, so seemingly small changes, are actually a large change in the amount of sound you are exposed to.

The consequences of hearing loss can be particularly devastating for children. The Center for Disease Control and Prevention report that even a small degree of hearing loss can affect a child's speech and language comprehension. According to The American Speech-Language-Hearing Association (ASHA), "children with hearing loss have difficulty with all areas of academic achievement, especially reading and mathematical concepts. Children with mild to moderate hearing losses, on average, achieve one to four grade levels lower than their peers with normal hearing."

In Canada, the Canadian Consumer Product Safety Act states that a toy, "must not make or emit noise of more

than 100 dB when measured at the distance that the toy would ordinarily be from the ear of the child who is using it". This is equivalent to a motorcycle or lawnmower. Unfortunately, small children don't always play with toys in their intended manner. When a toy is brought close to the ears, the danger is even greater, as the decibel level can increase to 120dB, versus 100dB, which is equivalent to the sound of a jet engine on take-off.

In 2006, the Canadian Association of Speech-Language Pathologists and Audiologists lobbied members of Parliament and Health Canada to decrease the 100dB limit, however guidelines have not changed. Here are some tips to help keep your kids safe:

• The Sight & Hearing Association releases an "Annual Noisy Toys List" which is available on-line.

• Listen to a toy before you purchase it. If it sounds loud at arm's length, it will be louder at close range in your child's hands.

• There are free apps to download on your phone that measure decibels – search for "decibel meter."

Look for toys with volume controls and on/off switches.
Supervise your child when they are playing with a loud toy. Move the toy further away as doubling the distance will significantly lower the decibels. Teach them to keep it away from their ears and face.

• Limit the amount of time allowed with the toy.

The key to keeping your child hearing healthy is knowing how much loud sound they're exposed to. A 'noise diet' can protect their hearing from future problems.

# Cyclamen Kalanchoe

As we approach the holiday season I have gifts on my mind. Gardener friends are easier to buy for than nongardeners, in my experience, as they are usually pleased with a live gift. As for myself, if it is colourful and lasts a few weeks, I am delighted. It being Christmas soon, our choices are not limited to the always popular Poinsettia (now available in an amazing array of shades), Christmas cactus and Amarylis bulb (also available in many shapes and colours). This year I will be in search of flowering plants not so seasonal, but beautiful nevertheless.

Cyclamen persicum, also known as Florist's cyclamen, are available in stores and garden centres and make lovely gifts. Varieties range from mini to medium to very large; colours range from pure white through all the warm shades of pink, fuschia and red. The blooms stand up perkily above the foliage (roundish or heart shaped leaves, with attractive patterns) and bend over to look down. Choose one that looks healthy and has many unopened buds. Like so many of our house plants, the original cyclamen grows wild in the Mediterranean countries, and have been hybridized for our indoor enjoyment. In their natural home, they grow on hillsides among rocks, coming into bloom in the cooler months of winter and spring, and going dormant during the heat of summer and fall. Ours have been forced into bloom for our convenience by controlled environments in greenhouses. As long as you respect their need for a cooler space with light (no hot sun), and good drainage, your plant should be happy for weeks and even months. A tray with rocks and water for humidity is always appreciated, but do not let the pot touch the water. When quite dry, soak the pot in a few inches of water, allowing it to rehydrate, drain, and replace in its bright location. Watering from the top is risky as the concave top of the corm will rot if it gets wet too often. Your cyclamen will

automatically go dormant when it has finished blooming, its leaves turning yellow, and no new growth in evidence. This is perfectly normal—you didn't kill it. Many people now discard it and move on to something else. If you are determined to rejuvenate it, however, you must put it (pot and all) in a cool dry place and pretend it is under a Mediterranean rock for a few months. In the fall, lift the corm, repot it in good potting soil and begin watering again. I haven't done this, but the books say it is possible.

Kalanchoe bossfeldana (cousin of the Jade plant) is a low maintenance succulent. Unlike the cyclamen who wants to be cool, kalanchoe thrives in a warm sun-filled window. No humidity tray is needed, just water when dry and thoroughly drain. Succulents are more often killed by too much water than by too little. Clusters of blooms (white through yellow, orange and red) on upright stems will last for months, and if you want to try a second time, water less for a few months and give it a rest. The experts say you must do the "dark closet" thing for 12 hours a day to trick it into thinking the season has changed (kalanchoe, like poinsettia and Christmas cactus are photoperiodic plants); I have found, though, that our change of daylight hours at this latitude does the job without any closets involved. You just need to accept that the plant will bloom on its own schedule, not yours. My Christmas cactus are all in full bloom in October and November, despite their name. (I have seen them called "Holiday Cactus" in some places-a more appropriate label.)

#### SNIC (Snow & Ice Removal)

With winter upon us and snowflakes hitting our city streets, it's a good idea to re-familiarize everyone with the City's SNIC program. Roads has a pre-planned, measured response to snowfall that helps make roads safe. The City maintains roads during winter months by:

- Anti-icing before a snow event;
- Sanding, salting and plowing roads; and
  Snow fencing where required.

Roads are cleared based on a Council-approved priority system. The more traffic there is on a road, the higher the priority. The highest priority roads are classified as Priority 1s. The lowest are Priority 4s. Roads is responsible for clearing snow and ice from public roadways and LRT stations. Parks is responsible for the pathway system.
