

5 Summer Travel Safety Tips

Happy (almost) summer everyone!

We hope you have been having a great June so far! June is always a busy month at the shelter as preparation for our summer camp program kicks in to high gear. All month long we will be preparing to welcome hundreds of young campers to enjoy their summer with us! With summer vacations on the horizon our call centre has also been getting a lot of guestions about how to best keep pets safe while travelling this summer, so this month we are bringing you our top 5 summer travel safety tips for your pet!

- 1. Make sure identification is up to date! Nothing is more scary than having your pet go missing in a strange place, but having up to date identification greatly increases the chances your pet will get back to you safely! Double check your pet's collar tag and the registration on their tattoo or microchip to ensure your information is correct. If you will be using a different phone number while on vacation consider having a special collar tag made for the trip.
- 2. Update your pet's vaccines and preventative medications! Pay a visit to your vet before vacation to find out what vaccines and preventative medications your pet should have. Just as with humans, vaccinations should be based on where your pet is visiting. Your vet is the best person to advise on what vaccines are most appropriate for your pet.
- 3. Bring fresh water for Fido! Just like humans our pets can catch parasites, like giardia, from drinking out of streams or rivers. Bring fresh water to keep Fido happy and hydrated.
- 4. Bring plenty of your pet's regular food! Sudden changes in food type can leave a pet with an upset tummy. We recommend bringing a few extra days' worth of kibble, just in case!

5. NEVER leave your pet in the car! The temperature inside a car can climb dangerously high very fast, even when parked in the shade. Pre-plan your journey to be pet friendly and bring a leash so a travel companion can take your pet for a walk if you need to stop for supplies.

Theft Prevention in your **Community:** Recyclable **Containers**

Theft of recyclable/refundable items, such as bottles and cans, continues to be a concern for many Calgary communities. To prevent your home or property from becoming a target for thieves, the Calgary Police Service offers the following tips:

- Take refundable containers such as pop cans and milk jugs to bottle depots. Refundable containers left in blue carts encourage people to go through the contents, which can lead to littering and vandalism.
- Refundable containers left out and accessible may also attract bottle pickers to your community.
- · Do not leave refundable containers unattended in your backyard. These items offer a target for thieves who may enter your property.
- Lock refundable containers in your home or garage.
- Lock any gates with access to your property to deter unwanted individuals from entering.
- If you don't find recycling depots convenient, you may also consider donating your refundable containers to local bottle drives, or simply dropping the containers off at a bottle depot. Many depots have a bin for donations and the money collected goes to charitable organizations.

If you notice your recyclables have been taken from your backyard without your consent, contact the police non-emergency line at 403-266-1234 or report online via www.calgarypolice.ca. If you see a prowler outside your home, call 9-1-1 immediately.

Hi friends and neighbours,

My office is often asked, 'What are you doing for seniors?' so I'm pleased to let you know some of the ways we are working to make life better for Alberta Seniors.

Affordable Housing

\$1.2 billion investment in affordable housing projects over five years include many seniors housing units across Alberta. Affordable housing for seniors has not kept up with the demands and we are taking action to address this across the province. The Provincial Affordable Housing Strategy will support development decisions both now and for the future. Thirty-three housing projects specifically for seniors are currently underway and these projects will upgrade or replace approximately 2,000 units and add over 1000 units of new ones. In addition, investment is being made to improve the condition and safety of current facilities.

Aging in Place

Last year more than 116,000 Albertans (of all ages) received home-care services and Budget 2017 is boosting funding for home and community care by \$200 million, supporting more Albertans to home care and remain independent. This funding will provide seniors with important services that support them to live and participate in their communities. Home-care clients pay no fees for publicly provided personal care or professional health-care services.

The Seniors Home Adaptation and Repair Program (SHARP), started in July 2016 to support independent living for Alberta's seniors. Seniors can use the equity in their homes to make the necessary repairs and adaptations that will allow them to stay in their own homes and communities. Low-interest home equity loans up to \$40,000 per household to seniors with household income of \$75,000 or less who have at least 25% home equity. These loans are for renovations such as roof and window replacements, electrical repairs, or accessibility changes.

Seniors Advocate

A new Seniors Advocate, Dr. Sheree Kwong See, was appointed in September for a term that will last until the end of 2019. In her role as seniors advocate she:

- Provides resolution support to senior Albertans and their families:
- Identifies trends and systemic issues affecting seniors;
- Makes recommendations to the government on how to improve senior services and programs.

Other ways we are making a difference

- Banning door-to-door sales of energy products, seniors are being protected from misleading, highpressure sales practices.
- Alberta Parks is removing barriers, to ensure parks are more accessible for seniors. Alberta Parks is working to identify all the facilities that are barrier-free and is making that information public. All parks facilities are now built for accessibility.
- The three-year \$3-million Taking Action Against Elder Abuse Co-ordinated Community Response (CCR) grant program supports the development or enhancement of community responses to elder abuse in all regions of Alberta through improved collaboration among service providers.
- · Budget 2017 takes the next step in fulfilling this government's commitment to creating 2,000 new long-term care beds. It commits funds to build a new facility in Bridgeland and to upgrade and expand the Norwood Capital Care facility in Edmonton. Together these projects will create hundreds of new long-term care spaces. Both are fully publicly owned.

TAKE ON WELLNESS AHS – Hospice

Hospice, one of many options for end-of-life care

In Alberta, there are many options to get palliative and end of life care—your home, a hospital, a continuing care centre, or a hospice.

Hospices are places made to feel like home while giving specialized end of life care, 24/7. The care teams focus on comfort and quality of life, and can help patients and their family cope with feelings about serious illness.

In a hospice, palliative care is provided by health professionals, volunteers, and spiritual counsellors. Services include:

- managing pain
- helping with daily living activities (personal care)
- emotional, psychological and spiritual support.

Before accessing palliative care or a hospice, a health care team discusses with patients on what's important to them and where they would like to be at the time of their illness where they may either have: a life expectancy of less than 3 months; signed a form saying they do not want to be resuscitated or a need to be in a bed or chair most of the time. A patient's choice may change as an illness changes, and individuals can get palliative and end of life care at any time.

There's also a new program that's helping to bring emergency care to people who get palliative and end of life care in their homes. The EMS Assess, Treat, Refer program has Emergency Medical Services, home care clinicians, doctors, and families working together to help people stay in their homes if that's what they wish.

Responsible Pet Ownership in Parks

As we all enjoy being outside and spending time with our family, friends and pets; we want to ensure we are creating as safe place for all our neighbours. Knowing and adhering to the regulations in the Responsible Pet Ownership Bylaw 23M2006 helps to ensure that dogs are not being a nuisance in the community and dogs and citizens are safe.

City of Calgary would like to remind dog owners of the following:

- When off of their owner's property, dogs must be on a leash unless in a designated off-leash area.
- When in designated off-leash areas, dog owners must ensure their dog is under control, is within their sight and responds to commands.
- Parking lots adjacent to off-leash areas are on leash.
- Owners are responsible for picking up all waste produced by their dog.
- Dogs are not allowed in school grounds, playgrounds, sport fields, golf courses, cemeteries, wading and swimming areas, and other areas prohibited by signs.
- Dogs must be walked on the right-hand side of the pathway on a leash that is no more than two metres in length and must not interfere with other pathway users.
- Owners cannot cycle, in-line skate or skateboard on a pathway with a leashed dog.
- Dogs must not enter or swim in any body of water within a park except a river that runs through, or is adjacent to, a City park.
- Dogs must have and wear a City of Calgary licence when the dog is three-months-old

When we respect the bylaw, we contribute to a safer and healthier community.

Thank you for being responsible dog owners and valued community partners.


Guides Canada BLACKFOOT DISTRICT

Dear Constituents:

As we reach the end of the session of Alberta's legislative assembly, I am pleased to share the government's most recent initiatives to make lives of Albertans better. Thank you to all who came to our Calgary-Glenmore office open house on May 12, 2017.

Participation in the House: I had first reading of the Calgary Jewish Centre Amendment Act, 2017 passed in the house; and sponsored the bill through the Standing Committee on Private Bills, which passed.

I was honored to propose Motion 508 to: "Urge the Government to recognize the first week of each February as World Interfaith Harmony Week in support of the United Nations General Assembly resolution 65/5"

Student Aid/Advanced Education Funding: The Alberta government is making life better by helping students receive financial support to pursue adult learning opportunities.

- \$630 million set aside this year for student loans to assist an estimated 81,000 students pursue postsecondary education. This is a \$51 million increase from Budget 2016.
- Affordability is an issue, which is why the government has budgeted \$252 million for student aid, including \$96 million in scholarships and awards to approximately 54,500 students and \$56 million in grants to approximately 16,400 students. This includes \$4.4 million more in funding for the Alexander Rutherford Scholarship to meet increased demand.
- Budget 2017 also provides an additional \$4.2 million to support more than 8500 students interested in accessing the Alberta Low Income Grant.

LRT/Green Line: We have been in close contact with Mayor Nenshi on this project. Calgary Council is still looking at their options, and have not landed on a specific proposal or estimated cost.

• Our government remains open to discussions about a provincial role in funding the Green Line, and we will continue to follow the proceedings at Calgary City Council as it works out the details of the proposed project.

• On December 3, 2016 we announced \$147.8 million for critical work on Calgary's Green Line Corridor. Budget 2017 also includes \$305 million for the new Alberta Community Transit Fund, which will be announced later this year.

SWBRT: It is important to highlight that the City of Calgary has jurisdiction over city infrastructure development and transit routes, not the Province. More details can be found at: calgary.ca/swbrt

- The work currently happening on 14th street, throughout this summer, is not related to the SWBRT. It is ATCO work required for the SW Ring Road.
- SWBRT work on 14th Street will begin next year and will be completed in 2019.
- SWBRT project was approved by City Council in July of 2016 with the last round of public engagements completed a couple of months ago. Also approved and starting construction is the pedestrian overpass at 90th Ave over 14th street.
- The SWBRT design work and coordination with ATCO is completed and the budget allocated.
- I invited and attended the MGA review open house with community delegates last year.

St. Gerard School

Cote's grade 4/5 students participated in Chevron Open Minds Zoo School. Students experienced in- depth exposure to both local and global plants and animals. The week culminated with a Bollywood dance showcase that was presented in front of the school community to the delight of parents and family members!

Monthly, St. Gerard School, thanks to the kind donations of parents, feeds the hungry through the provision of sandwiches. Last month, we contributed five loaves of uncut sandwiches to the Awo Taan Healing Lodge Society. As needs within the community change, so does our level of support for various local groups. Awo Taan is an emergency shelter whose mission is to provide short- term housing and long- lasting holistic support to Indigenous women and children, as well as those of all cultural backgrounds.

Last month, one student representative from each grade was invited to attend the Gala D'Art Oratoire at Bishop McNally High School in honor of student success in French Immersion. The Gala is a showcase and a celebration of student achievement in French public speaking. In the past, presentations were developed in the classrooms under the supervision of the classroom teacher as part of the regular French Language Arts program of studies, such as the development of original texts, memorizations of fables, poems, etc. A wonderful way to promote language learning programs while praising individual accomplishment in front of friends and family of Calgary Catholic French Immersion schools at large!

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
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Why Art Matters

Many of us enjoy the experience of seeing a live show, be it music, dance, or theatre. We leave these experiences feeling more inspired, more creative, and more at peace with the world around us.


But in the grand scheme of things, does art really matter? Does it really have a powerful impact on our lives, on our health, on our community, and on our society?

We have solid research on the impact of the arts on the economy. In the *Arts Impact Alberta 2014* study, the Alberta Foundation for the Arts (AFA) found that "the total output of the sector is roughly \$347 million". Additionally, the not-for-profit arts organizations that Alberta Foundation for the Arts funded provided approximately 700 full-time and 2,700 part-time positions with the majority (85%) of Albertans reporting that the attend at least one arts event per year.

It seems the arts do improve our society. But what about us, personally? A recent study from The University of Western Australia has found that "participating in the arts for just two hours a week can improve mental health and wellbeing". Participants surveyed were asked how they felt after the experience, and the respondents used descriptors like "optimistic", "useful", "relaxed", and "good about myself". One of the study's co-authors concluded: "arts engagement increases people's happiness, confidence, and self-esteem, while reducing stress and social isolation".

Fortunately for us, Calgary is a great city to get out and experience art, whether it is in a gallery, on a stage, at a festival or even taking an art class. For a good overview of the breadth of arts and culture in Calgary, visit lifein-calgary.ca/todo/arts-culture
