

## HISTORIC SUNALTA

### Sunalta Community – AS Overview

The community of Sunalta was developed by the Canadian Pacific Railway (“CPR”) on a Dominion land grant. It was originally laid out in a classic gridiron plan and the original 25-foot lots were sold from 1909 to 1911. The lots originally sold for ~\$250 each.

“Sunalta” was chosen as the community name – apparently originating from an elementary school contest – and it is a contraction of “Sunny Alberta”.

Sunalta was developed just as Calgary's first major real estate boom was underway and, because of this, the community was almost completely built out by the end of 1915. In fact, sales were so brisk in the early stages that the CPR decided to move ahead with the 2<sup>nd</sup> Sunalta extension of 1911-1912. Note that by 1911, Sunalta was equipped with utilities, postal service and a streetcar line, making it a viable community and of Calgary's liveliest new suburbs.

Given the community was an attractive place to build, land prices began to peak and people lined up all night to buy lots on the beautiful streets. Lots now commanded an average selling price of ~\$1,100 per lot and a good two-story home could then be built for around \$4,000. As a matter of interest, this Sunalta extension came to be known as Scarboro.

Calgary's real estate boom collapsed just after “Scarboro” extension was sold out and only 20 houses were built by 1918 - mostly on Scarboro Avenue.

Sunalta School, along with the new streetcar and the intriguing mix of land use (ie. residential, light industrial and commercial), gave both the communities of Sunalta and Scarboro a massive boost when it was built on the western edge of the city. A number of lots went back to the City because of unpaid taxes in the 1930s and it would be nearly 40 years before the area was entirely built out.

Sunalta (and it's close neighbour Scarboro) are both small, old historical communities in relation to burgeoning Calgary. With it's rich history, the Sunalta community story is a story about people who have believed in the community, it's a story about people who have believed in the inner city and it's a story of people who have worked tirelessly to make what Sunalta is today.

### Snow and Ice Control

We know how to do winter in Calgary, and when it comes to clearing the snow and ice from our roads and pathways, we're getting better all the time. Throughout the winter months and especially after a big dump of snow, Calgary Roads has crews available around the clock to sand, salt and plow. Here's how it works:

#### Before the Snow Falls

Even before it snows, City crews are busy anti-icing roadways to reduce the accumulation of ice and snow on the roads. A Road Salt Management Plan is followed to improve environmental protection without compromising road safety. The City also uses snow fences as part of the annual winter road maintenance program. Over 140 strategically placed snow fences reduce the build-up of drifting snow and ice on roads, and help to keep winter roads safe by improving visibility for motorists.

#### During and After the Snow Falls

The City sands, salts, and plows roads and select sidewalks based on a priority system, and all work is to be completed within seven days from the point a snowfall ends. Within 24 hours of the end of a snowfall, major roadways (Priority 1) with traffic volumes over 20,000 vehicles per day are completely plowed, sanded and salted. A Snow Route Parking Ban may also be declared during this time – visit [www.calgary.ca](http://www.calgary.ca) to find out. Within 48 hours, all Priority 2 roadways are completed; this includes bus routes, problem areas and roads that carry over 5,000 vehicles per day. Work then continues on Priority 3 and 4 roadways, focusing on designated hills and slower speed zones, and eventually moving on to sidewalks and pathways.

#### What You Can Do

The City of Calgary has a very sophisticated Snow and Ice Control program, and it does great work every year, but residents need to pitch in as well.

- When you drive in the winter, don't fool around: get winter tires.
- When you cycle in the winter, perform regular maintenance on your bike.
- When you walk in the winter, wear shoes with good grip.
- Homeowners are responsible for removing snow and ice from parking spaces, driveways and sidewalks.
- Be patient, and let the City follow the Seven Day Snow Event Plan. If something isn't right, however, report it to 3-1-1.
- Drive, cycle and walk safely. Give yourself extra time, don't rush, and be courteous to others.

November is here, and that means that the Legislature is back in session, and my life gets even busier than it has been.

When I'm out and about in the community, people often ask me "Why? It's not like there's an election soon?" My answer is simple: How else can I honestly represent the entire riding if I don't know how people living here are feeling?

If I want to be a true conduit for the ebb and flow of the communities I represent, it is essential that I know what's actually going on in those communities.

So when I walk in to the legislature, when I sit in committees, I am always thinking about people here in Calgary Currie whose lives will be touched by the legislation at hand. I think about the kind of stories they have told me. Stories about their successes, and stories about the problems they are facing.

When I'm door knocking I hear all sorts of stories. Neighborhood kids come up and ask about a playground in their area, and I'll meet a senior who is having difficulty getting out to socialize, or a drywall professional facing a downturn in construction. To know about the lives people are leading, to know what is going on in their life, to then take that to the Legislature, is one of the things that gives me my greatest strength when I speak in the chamber.

The story of Alberta is one that builds on the past and continues today. It is a story that is being carried forward in the daily lives we lead, in the daily trials and tribulations we face; It is a story being written every day by each and everyone one of us who plays a part of the Calgary Currie Community.

I will also make note that just like for the past 98 years, November is the month we take time aside and remember those who have had their lives taken in the service of their country. Remembrance Day ceremonies are held at the Military Museums, as well as the local Killarney Legion, and of course at the Cenotaph downtown.

### We Remember

As November 11<sup>th</sup> approaches, I hope you once again take time to remember those that have sacrificed, those that continue to take on the perilous work of safeguarding Canadian freedoms, and the soldiers who are now representing us abroad as peacekeepers.

It is my honour and pleasure to serve as our nation's Minister of Veterans Affairs. In this role I am entrusted with the mandate to support our veterans – young and old – and in the commemoration of all of Canada's past conflicts.

Just one of the memories that I will be reflecting on this month is the impact of the First World War on Western Canada High School where some 170 Old Boys and 6 Masters had enlisted by 1916. The Calgary Herald estimated some 40% of all the boys who ever attended the college had enlisted and went off to war: and you can see this sacrifice memorialized at the cenotaph today just behind the school. Young men, with their entire futures in front of them, were brought into one of the world's most brutal conflicts and sacrificed themselves our freedoms. It is a story I think of often when I attend ceremonies across this country and serve as Minister of Veterans Affairs.

Now, it has been nearly a year since I was appointed by Prime Minister Justin Trudeau as a member of his cabinet. In last year's election campaign we promised Canadians a government that would uphold our sacred obligation to veterans.

In Budget 2016 the Government of Canada put **\$5.6 billion** additional dollars into Veterans Affairs, showcasing a clear commitment to bettering the lives of our nation's heroes.

This year we have announced the re-openings of the nine Veterans Affairs offices closed by the previous government. In addition to reopening these much needed offices – which support veterans across this country – we are also opening an extra office in Surrey, BC, to support the thousands of veterans who live in that city. Above and beyond this we have increased benefits to veterans by increasing the Earning Loss Benefit to 90% from 75%, increased the Disability Award and are on track to hire up to 400 more frontline staff. With increasing benefits and frontline staff we can better support veterans and make sure they transition smoother into civilian life.

It is in this sacred trust I continue to work to better the lives of veterans and keep the promises we made in the 2015 election.

1. Name: Jennifer M. Stinson
2. How long have you lived in Sunalta? Six years, since fall 2010.
3. How long have you volunteered with the community? Two and a half years.
4. Role in community and/or vocation: Sunalta Community Garden Member, Sunalta Safe Community Initiative Committee Member, and Artist-at-Large.
5. Why do you volunteer? I volunteer to be involved in my community for many reasons, including getting involved in community events and meeting people in the neighborhood; giving back to the community; collaborating on larger projects for the whole community to enjoy; and making the community a more beautiful and enjoyable place.
6. What/who got you into volunteering? I started using the Sunalta Wildflower Garden compost bins shortly after moving to the area. After a while, I connected with WFG regulars Tanya McFerrin and Andrea Zittlau, and started helping out with a little weeding. When the Little Library went up in spring 2014, I decided it needed a sign. Using recycled wood and my own paints, I created and in-

stalled the sign. I was then invited to paint the wooden bench in the WFG, and created the Kaleidoscope Bench using the garden's paint supplies. I received a Volunteer Award that winter, and connected with the friendly people of the Sunalta Community Association, and our community social worker Silvia Ross. They invited me to paint the benches and picnic table behind the Community Hall, and that project began in summer 2015.

7. What are you most proud of accomplishing in the community? Proudest volunteer achievement? I am very proud of the Sunalta Community Garden. Over two weekends in spring 2015, dozens of Sunalta residents and their families came together with their own tools, time, and plenty of muscle to build the set of unique honeycomb garden plots behind the Community Hall. It was also made possible by the volunteerism of the members of the Sunalta Community Association through their time and planning, and the grant and materials they secured from the City. It was truly a great example of community teamwork, resulting in a new amenity for Sunalta.

8. What specific projects/initiatives have you lead/been a part of? Creating the Little Library sign; painting the Kaleidoscope Bench at the WFG; adding the game board to the WFG picnic table; various arts and crafts at the WFG such as at the annual Pumpkin Hunt; the craft table at the 2015 Sunalta Neighbor Day; building the Community Garden; helping lead the Sunalta Jane's Walk in 2016;

painting the Circles Bench, Feathers Bench, and picnic table at the hall; and future plans include a sign for the Community Garden and painting more benches around Sunalta.

9. Why is it important to volunteer? Volunteering gives back, builds community through bringing people together for a common goal, and fosters relationship-building. By coming together, great things can be accomplished. When each person contributes what they have a talent for, amazing projects can be realized while sharing our best with others.

10. Why is community important to you? Community is like the extended family we have in our neighborhood, whether you consider your neighborhood to be your block, your area of town, or your city. Building community is about building connections with our neighbors. Communities are stronger when residents know each other and work together. It's a great feeling to walk through the community and be greeted by several people you know along the way.

You will meet new people and make connections, get the scoop on upcoming events, learn other resident's cool insider secrets about Sunalta, and feel great about any contribution you make.
